Nursery-Summer Term 2023

Key learning - children will have opportunities to:

Personal, **Social and Emotional Development** – start to enjoy the company of others. Play alongside others. Share or take turns with others with adult guidance. Settle for a while to activities. Show effortal control. Talk about their emotions and explore them through play and stories. Engage in pretend play and play with other children extending their ideas. Resolve their own conflicts in play. Develop social confidence. Select resources and activities to achieve self chosen goals or suggested. Develop a sense of belonging to the team of our class. See themselves as a valuable individual. Builds constructive and respectful relationships. Express their feelings and considers the feelings of others. Show resilience in the face of challenge. Identify and moderate their feelings socially and emotionally. Think about the perspectives of others. Manage their own needs.

Communication and Language -

To have adult support to shift their attention from one thing to another. To regularly use at least 300 words including descriptive, space, time and function words. To use longer sentences of 5 or more words and pronouns (I him, he, it etc) and prepositions (on, under, in etc) To follow simple instructions. To understand simple questions. To listen to stories and understand what is happening with the help of pictures.

To listen to longer stories and to do more than one thing at a time. To develop their vocabulary and understand questions with two parts and "why" questions. To learn rhymes and songs and to tell a long story. To develop their pronunciation. To have a conversation and to take turns talking. To learn about rhyme. To use longer sentences of six or more words and to use talk to organise their play.

To understand how to listen carefully and why this is important. To learn new vocabulary and use this through the day in different contexts. To ask questions and to find out and use a range of connectives in speech. To describe some events in detail. To use talk to help them work out and organise thinking, activities, how things work and why they may happen. To develop use of social phrases (Good Morning) - To retell stories showing deep familiarity with the text - To learn poems - To look at non fiction books and uses them to develop knowledge and vocabulary.
